

Looking Back at a Legacy: Celebrating the 70th Anniversary of Pueblo Junior College's Historic 1956-57 Season

As the 2026-2027 sports calendar unfolds, it marks a remarkable milestone in regional collegiate sports history: the 70th anniversary of the legendary **1956-1957 Pueblo Junior College (PJC) men's basketball season**.

Entering the season, the Indians had only one starter and four reserves returning from the 1955-1956 team that placed sixth nationally,

Coached by Harry H. Simmons, the Indians put together one of the most memorable campaigns in junior college basketball history, finishing with a **31-6 overall record** and etching their name into national prominence. PJC also posted a perfect 10-0 record in Empire Conference play for the first-time



Dominance on the Hardwood - Under the guidance of "The Chief," PJC asserted its dominance early and often. The Indians captured the **Southern Division of the Empire Conference** crown, playing an aggressive, high-scoring brand of basketball that thrilled local fans.

PJC's offensive firepower was anchored by standout freshman center **Ken Anderson** of Moline, Ill. Anderson led the Empire Conference in scoring and earned prestigious **second-team NJCAA All-American honors**. Appearing in 36 games, Anderson dominated the paint and stat sheets alike, racking up a staggering **816 points** for a **22.7 points-per-game average**, fueled by 295 field goals and 226 free throws.

The supporting cast ran deep, featuring key contributors such as:

- **Al Roots** (Fr., Kansas City, Kan.): 35 games, 449 points (12.8 PPG)
- **Jim Ulm** (Fr., Frankfort, Ind.): 35 games, 342 points (9.8 PPG)
- **Vince Ignatowicz** (Fr., Elizabeth, N.J.): 35 games, 324 points (9.3 PPG)
- **Dale Allen** (Soph., Rocky Ford, Colo.): 37 games, 301 points (8.1 PPG)

As a team, the Indians averaged **79.9 points per game** across their 37-contest schedule while holding opponents to just 61.5 PPG, reflecting a squad that excelled on both ends of the floor. Prior to postseason play, PJC was nationally recognized, tying for **sixth in the final NJCAA rankings**.

Road to Hutchinson

The postseason brought high drama and unforgettable moments to Pueblo. Hosting the **Region IX playoffs** at home inside the raucous atmosphere of "**The Pit**," the Indians rose to the occasion. PJC swept through the regional bracket—defeating Northeastern (82-59) on March 8 and handling Trinidad (79-67) on March 9—to secure the championship and punch their ticket to the national stage.

This triumph sent PJC to the **NJCAA National Tournament in Hutchinson, Kansas**, marking the program's **third consecutive appearance** at the national showcase.

- **March 19:** Defeated Murray (69-53)
- **March 20:** Defeated Boise (72-54)
- **March 22:** Lost to San Angelo (65-78)
- **March 23:** Defeated Moberly (93-83) in the third-place game

Ken Anderson scored 75 points in the nationals and was named to the all-tournament team. With Anderson plagued with foul problems, Dale Allen, the lone returning starter from the previous season, scored 37 points in the third-place game against Moberly and finished with 69 points for the four games.

By capturing third place in the nation, Simmons and his squad cemented a golden chapter in Pueblo athletics - a standard of excellence that continues to resonate 70 years later.

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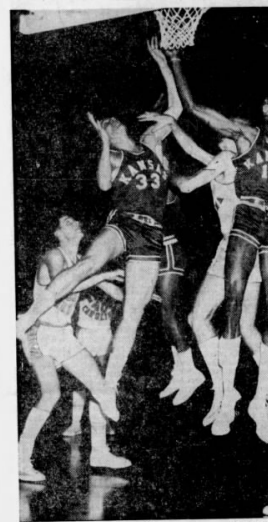
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North Carolina Nips Kansas In Third Overtime, 54-53
